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
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## **INTRODUCTION**

## 2. POPULAR DISTRICTS AND PLACES

## 3.2 FIERA DI SINIGAGLIA

**Location**: Along the Darsena, near Porta Genova

**Schedule**: Every Saturday

## 4. SHOPPING TIPS



#### **4.1 SHOPS**

- **Sales Seasons**: Take advantage of the winter (January to February) and summer (July to August) sales for significant discounts. During these periods, you can find reductions of up to 50% or more on many items.
- Tax Refund: Non-EU tourists can claim a VAT refund for purchases over a certain amount. Remember to keep your receipts and ask for a tax-free form in stores. At the airport, present your receipts, tax-free forms, and purchases to customs for validation before you check in your luggage.
- Store Hours: Most shops in Milan are open from 10 AM to 7:30 PM, Monday to Saturday. Some shops may close for a long lunch break, typically from 1 PM to 3:30 PM. On Sundays, larger stores and shopping malls are usually open, while smaller boutiques may be closed.
- **Payment Methods**: Credit cards are widely accepted, but it's always a good idea to carry some cash, especially when shopping at markets or smaller boutiques.



#### 4.2 MARKETS

- **Arrive Early**: The best items often get picked up early in the day. Arriving early also means fewer crowds, giving you a more relaxed shopping experience.
- Cash is King: While some vendors may accept credit cards, it's best to carry cash, especially for smaller purchases.
- **Haggling**: Don't be afraid to negotiate the price. Haggling is common in markets, and you might get a great deal if you're polite and reasonable.
- **Comfortable Attire**: Wear comfortable shoes and clothes, as you'll likely spend several hours walking and browsing through stalls.
- **Research**: Check the market schedules and any special events in advance to make the most of your visit.
- **Transportation**: If you're planning to buy larger items, consider how you'll transport them. Some markets may offer delivery services, or you might need to arrange your own.
